Year 10 are developing their speaking skills in line with the GCSE and are becoming more familiar with answering roleplay and photocard style questions. Religious Education

Key Stage 3

Year 7 have been studying the similarities and differences of world religions. Lessons have been engaging and thought provoking with pupils asking questions about Hinduism and Sikhism. In Year 8 pupils have been studying the work of Jesus and his miracles and using drama to express their understanding. In Year 9, the focus has been on the Christian views of the role of men and women. We have had lively discussions with pupils sharing their opinions regarding how some of these views could be perceived as being outdated in today's 21st Century. Pupils shared information about roles of men and women in their families and were keen to talk about the support that they offer too at home with younger siblings and working parents.

In addition, mock examinations began this week for our Year 11 pupils with two papers to be sat in Geography. All pupils have been advised to revise both human and physical topics and to utilise our department revision guides and workbooks. It is of upmost importance that all pupils try their very best in all examinations.

Upcoming events in the geography department:

After the mocks, Year 11 will be conducting fieldwork as part of their GCSE course. Our entire cohort will be visiting Clapham in North Yorkshire to complete a river study as part of their physical geography field work. Our pupils will be putting on their 'wellies' and getting to grips with nature in the river calculating erosion rates and velocity change downstream. Fingers crossed for nice weather!

Remembrance Commemorations

Pupils were involved in 'Remembrance Day' commemorations, with the whole school involved in the British Legion's theme of 'Remember Together'. During PDC lessons pupils investigated the pioneering work of individuals during the First World War. For example the work of LB Robertson who created a method to give blood transfusions on the Western Front or H Boyle who created apparatus to offer anaesthetics to injured soldiers. In assembly pupils were supported in reflecting on the importance of Remembrance Day, they each made a poppy giving thanks to those who have served in conflicts since WW1 and some of these were displayed in the school gardens. Several pupils also represented DTRB by attending the Remembrance service at the Cenotaph in Wigan. In addition to listening to the service they laid a wreath on behalf of the school. Staff who attended with the pupils commented on the respectful conduct of the pupils.



Other news in the History Department:

Mock exams are currently underway for our Year 11 pupils. They are taking two mock papers, Crime and Punishment 1000AD – Present Day and Weimar and Nazi Germany 1919-1939. Well done to those pupils who have already been attending revision classes on Wednesday evenings after school.
