Headteacher Message

Last week we welcomed North Star filming into school to assist us with producing videos for our 'virtual' Open Evening – these videos are now available to few on our website and look absolutely fantastic. Please take a look and see how our pupils really do our school proud. You may have also seen our banners around Ince and the surrounding areas featuring a QR code to scan, these will also take you directly to the video links.

In light of some schools unfortunately having to send year groups home recently we have made the decision to bring forward our use of Google Classroom. All our staff are currently in the process of uploading their lessons to virtual classrooms which pupils will now be able to access at home, either on a laptop, a tablet or a phone. There are more details about this in the newsletter.

Thank you to all parents who have provided their child with a mask to come to school in. There are a very small minority of pupils who are continually arriving at school without one each day, we have made the decision to charge 80p for a mask if your child cannot provide their own.

Message from the CEO

I am taking the unusual step of writing to all parents/carers of pupils in The Dean Trust during these difficult times. We wish all our pupils who are ill with Covid19 a speedy recovery.

I would like to begin by thanking you all for your incredible patience and support, particularly those families affected by year groups having to self-isolate at home.

I am however seeking your further support. We have recently had cases of pupils coming into school who are clearly unwell. A number of these pupils have subsequently tested positive for Covid19. As a result, we have been advised by Public Health England to send home classes and occasionally full year groups of pupils.

I would urge that all our parents and carers remain vigilant of any symptoms that their child has that could indicate that they have Coronavirus (COVID-19) and ensure that they remain at home. It is then very important that contact is made with the local health protection team and a Covid19 test is taken. We are making every effort to keep as many pupils in school as possible but to succeed, we need to work together to limit the risk of transmission within our schools.



In particular I would like to give a special mention to some pupils who are working particularly well at the minute:





Faculty of the week - Humanities



My favourite time period in History to study is the Industrial Revolution. My main reason for enjoying this time period is that it allows me to study lots of local history. My home town of Blackburn contained numerous cotton mills during the Industrial Revolution as well as being the birth place of inventor James Hargreaves. Hargreaves was illiterate (couldn't read or write) and spent most of his life as a hand loom weaver. This led to him inventing the Spinning Jenny which made looming cotton much easier than it was doing it by hand and the yarn produced was much stronger. Hargreaves built a jenny for himself and sold several of them to his neighbours. As a child, my grandma took me to visit the textile museum in Blackburn where I saw a spinning jenny and this sparked my enthusiasm for learning about this time period. At university I studied the Industrial revolution from a more social perspective looking at the poor living and working conditions that people had to deal with at the time. Since becoming a teacher, I have enjoyed leading visits to Quarry Bank Mill and I have loved sharing clips from 'The Mill' with my classes when we have been studying the Industrial Revolution.

National Poetry Day




National Poetry Day takes place every year, celebrating and embracing poetry, with a new theme each time – this year, the theme is 'vision'.

To celebrate the event, our fantastic teachers at DTRB got creative and taught their curriculum through the art form of poetry.


In **Science**, our pupils had fun using key words from the topics they are currently studying to write their poems. Here are some examples:



Google Classroom

Dear Parent/Carer,

As part of our commitment to supporting pupils in the event of self-isolation or another potential Lockdown due to the ongoing COVID- 19/coronavirus situation, Dean Trust Rose Bridge have now launched the "Google Classroom" platform as a way of pupils accessing learning remotely whilst at home.

Google Classroom is a free and secure learning network for teachers, pupils and schools, and provides a safe way to set and mark work.

This week all pupils have been given the chance to set up their account and join their classrooms so they are able to access, complete and submit work online.

Google Classroom can be accessed through a free App either on the Apple Store or Google Play on both Apple and Android devices as well as through the internet on laptops or desktops.

To access the classroom from a home desktop or laptop:

Open https://classroom.google.com in a web browser

Locate the sign-in button at the top right of the screen

Pupils log-in using their DRTRB username followed by @thedeantrustmoodle.org along with their usual school password

On the 'classwork' tab, there will be assignments, quizzes or questions that are set by class teachers. Clear instructions will be provided to explain how to complete each task.

If there is an issue, children can send a private message to their class teacher asking for support.

We are fully committed to providing your child with access to learning if they do find themselves in a situation where they need to stay at home for a period of time. For those without access to the internet, hard copies of work will still continue to be provided.

If you have any questions regarding home learning, please contact your child's Head of Year in the first instance.
