

Key Stage 3 RE

This last half term, Y7 have begun exploring some of the reasons for and against the existence of God, including the problem of evil and suffering. Y8 have been learning about the religion of Sikhism and Y9 have been studying some of the different Philosophers who have tried to prove the existence of God using logic and reason.

Key Stage 3 PSHE

Key stage 3 have been exploring the topic of Being Me this half term. Looking at factors that impact society, values and their own health and wellbeing. Year 7 have focused on the transition to starting secondary school and bullying. Year 8 explored the development of themselves including puberty. Year 9 focused on tolerance, challenges and discrimination.

Key Stage 4 Citizenship

Y10 have begun their GCSE course by looking at the diversity in the UK and how we can live and work together cohesively. Y11 have begun Theme D and have been looking at how Citizens can make their voices hear in society on issues they feel passionately about changing, and we had a Q&A session with PC Gerrard.

Key Stage 4 Child Development

Year 10 have begun their Child development studies exploring the different types of equipment that must be taken into consideration when choosing. They have also explored the importance of recognising certain factors in doing so.

The tradition originated with the ancient Celtic festival of <u>Samhain</u>, when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts. In the eighth century, Pope Gregory III designated November 1 as a time to honour all saints. Soon, All Saints Day incorporated some of the traditions of Samhain. The evening before was known as All Hallows Eve, and later Halloween. Over time, Halloween evolved into a day of activities like trick-or-treating, carving jack-o-lanterns, festive gatherings, donning costumes and eating treats.

Challenge: can you write the opening of a story, set on Halloween, inspired by the image?




House System Half Term 1


DTRB's First Half Term of the House System



Attendance and

punctuality

Pupils should aim for attendance of at least 97%. Holidays taken during term

time will not be authorised and may incur a Fixed Penalty Notice / Fine.

Pupils absent from school for 10% of the time are defined as 'Persistent absentees'

Pupils need to be in school before 8.40am ready for



Pupils must be on time for all lessons.

PE kit

School PE kit must be worn every PE lesson.

Uniform

Footwear should be plain black shoes, business style with leather upper, black (knee) socks or tights.

Boots, large logos or coloured accessories are not permitted.

Be aware that some retailers call their training shoes, shoes,

If it looks like a trainer or nump it is, and these are not permitted. Pupils must be smart at all times.

Outdoor coats should be removed inside the building. Blazers and school ties are to be worn at all times.

Only badges awarded by the school may be worn upon the lapel of the blazer. Shirts must be tucked in

Trousers with the school logo. must be tailored with a crease (no jeans, skinny leg, leggings or chinos etc). Pinafores with the school logo, must be knee length. Skirts are not permitted.

Travel

Pupils should travel to and from school in full school uniform and as pupils are therefore representing the school they should behave in a respectful and courteous way.

Accessories, haircuts and facial hair

No extreme haircuts (full head shave, tram lines etc). Only natural colours/tones are acceptable. Accessories should be small in size and in the school colours.



Hair longer than shoulder length must be kept tied up at all times

Boys must be 'clean shaven'.

Hair should be no shorter than a No.2 all over.

Jewellery and makeup

For health and safety reasons pupils are not permitted to wear any jewellery other than a watch

NO earrings or piercings are allowed.

Makeup, false tan, permanent or semi permanent make up, nail varnish or accessories are not allowed (false nails and false eye lashes).

Healthy schools

Only water can be consumed in the classroom (750ml or less). Milk or water may be purchased at break or lunch time

No family size/sharing bags or sweets, chocolates or crisp etc are allowed.

Environment

Keep our school tidy, do not drop litter. No chewing gum.

Mobile phones and electronic devices

NO mobile phones or electronic devices should be brought into school (this includes smart watches).



However, pupils who need mobile phones for their journey to and from school should hand it in to the Attendance office upon their arrival at school.

Banned items

Banned items are any items which may cause damage to other pupils and or the school environment e.g. aerosols, cigarettes, marker pens, chewing gum, E-cigarettes. lighters, weapons etc.


