

At Dean Trust Rose Bridge, we believe that the standards of personal appearance are reflected in the attitudes of our pupils. PHYSICAL EDUCATION OF THE PHYSICAL EDUCATION

KS4 Sports Studies

This term, our Y10 and Y11 pupils have been busy preparing for their practical moderation unit for Sports Studies. Pupils are assessed in one individual and one team sport, and are required to demonstrate their technical skills, tactical awareness and understanding of the rules and regulations of their chosen sports. Some of the formal moderations have already taken place, and some sports are yet to be completed during HT4. So far, the commitment and professionalism of all pupils involved has been excellent.



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KS3 Lessons

This term, KS3 pupils have been challenged to articulate their learning and progress in PE, in the form of skills and knowledge.

To support pupils in this process, our changing room displays all showcase our skills and knowledge maps for every sport covered during each half term

Pupils have certainly improved their ability to explain their learning journey across a series of lessons, and are also growing in confidence when performing and showcasing their skills. This term, classes have completed trampolining, badminton and fitness lessons.

We are very proud of our pupils and look forward for watching their development during HT4.

The PE department was really impressed with not only the turnout at the recent Y9 options evening, but also level of interest the range of questions regarding our PE qualifications at KS4. From September 2023, there will be two courses running which offer different progression routes for pupils Post 16.

Sports Studies is heavily centred on developing personal leadership, practical performance and the wider issues surrounding the sports industry.

Alternatively, GCSE PE is traditionally a more science based qualification, with a large weighting of overall marks for knowledge of anatomy and physiology, and the sports performer in action.

We believe both courses are equally interesting, and will suit pupils who enjoy being active, have a deep interest in all aspects of Physical Education, and enjoy working with others.

We have had a fantastic start to the new year here in the Performing Arts Department, with a trip to the Lowry to watch Ocean at the End of the Lane, great attendance at our enrichment and lots of pupils benefiting from 'The Speak Up Project' run through the National Theatre. We must also celebrate the dedication, commitment and success of all the pupils involved in the Christmas Showcase with our talented KS4 Performing Arts pupils performing to Year 8, our local primary schools, Lakeland Care Home and local special needs schools. From Blood Brothers to Rock of Ages, musical performances of some great classics and lots of festive fun, our pupils really did us proud and put on a great show!











Showcase Assemblies

Before Christmas, we took the opportunity to showcase some of the wonderful talent we have in each Year group with performances in assemblies. Performances included a horror based on the story of Lady Mabel, an original rap from one of our Year 9 pupils and performances from both our Year 10 Music and Drama pupils.



Year 7 Music

Pupils are currently learning about how to understand chords. This involves students identifying notes of a musical scale and create a chord using the 1st, 3rd and 5th method. Students are learning how to play the chords they have created as a progression on keyboard, improving their hand coordination, communication and instrumental skills.



Year 8 Music

Students have been looking into popular music, and understanding how to make a song popular. Within this task students are learning to write a pop song using chord progressions and scales. This skill is then transferred onto instruments and music software. This is supporting their instrumental skills, music technology and analysis of popular music.

Year 9 Music

Students are currently expanding their knowledge on different styles of music through their understanding of BBC Live Lounge. This is where musicians take other popular songs and change the style of music. The students are doing this through group ensembles and using multiple instruments to help recreate a song, whilst changing the musical elements to assist with the conversion into another style of music.

Year 7 have made great progress this term through an exploration of the horror They genre. have developed their ability to devise and apply new drama techniques whilst applying their understanding of the genre. Some great final performances, well done year 7!





Year 8 have been developing their script work skills this term whilst studying the play Our Day Out. Pupils have demonstrated their ability to perform using characterisation with some fantastic vocal expression and great scouse accents!









In Year 9, students have been challenged to combine both devising and script work skills whilst performing in the style of John Godber. We have seen excellent use of characterisation and some fantastic multi-role with lots of pupils making huge progress this term.





Ocean at End of the Lane

Year 9 pupils visited The Lowry to take part in a page to stage event where they were given the fantastic opportunity to watch the National Theatre's The Ocean at the End of the Lane and take part in workshops with the cast and director of the show.







Option Lessons

Our Year 9 pupils have a tough decision to make this term as they decide their option subjects. To provide pupils with an overview of what to expect in Performing Arts at KS4 and to allow them to see the standard that they can meet, our Y11 Performing Art pupils have performed for all Year 9 classes as part of our option lessons. I have really high hopes for a fantastic cohort in Year 10 next year!



KS4 pupils are currently working on different elements of their examination. Year 10 Performing Arts pupils have been working on scenes from the play Blood Brothers as part of their Component 1 examination looking at costumes, props and lighting to enhance the scene. Year 11 pupils are working towards their final examination creating their own performances to reflect a brief.







In Music, Year 10 pupils have been studying a variety of musical genres as part of their component 1 assessment and our Year 11 Music pupils have been working on their unit 2 assessment whilst preparing for their next big performance as part of their unit 5 examination.







Speak Up

This term the Speak Up project that we began at the start of the year has gone from strength to strength. Our artist Emily is now working with our Year 8 pupils as well as pupils in both Wellbeing and Inclusion and all groups have had an excellent start. We also had a professional videographer in school to film some of the work that our Year 9s created, based on Christmas, at the end of last term.








BOOK OF THE WEEK:

Smoking a vape in a 'smoke free' area on council or school property can result in a £50


All shops in the area found to be selling to underaged pupils will be reported to the police and Trading Standards.

Top Tips for Parents and Carers

Have a look at the tips and links below with some suggestions on how to get you started and help you to stay safe and positive online. You and your family can #PlayYourPart in creating a better internet by...

Having conversations without judgement.

Whether by playing games, watching videos, or doing things your child enjoys, spending time together online is a great way to start conversations about the online world and how they're finding being a part of it.

It is important to ask questions and take an interest in what your child enjoys online. An essential part of having this open dialogue is to not judge, even if their behaviour or life online isn't what you wanted or expected. This ensures that your child feels they can come to you if ever they make a mistake or experience a problem online.

Knowing where you can learn more about their favourite apps and games.

Websites like Common Sense Media or The Family Gaming Database can be invaluable sources of information. When your child starts talking about a new game or app, why not do some research into the reporting and blocking options available? Then you can help your child if they come to you with an issue.

Getting support if things go wrong.

There are lots of organisations who are there to support you and your family if something has gone wrong. The Report Harmful Content website can help you with issues such as cyberbullying, impersonation and threats. You can report worrying behaviour towards children to CEOP. Find out more on Children's Get Help page.

Reassuring your child that whatever happens online, you are there to support them.

Let your child know that the best way to address any problem they have online, is to tell a trusted adult immediately. For example, this might include someone sending them a friend request; an online message; telling them to visit a specific website, or app; or asking them for their personal information. Reassure them that if anything happens online that they are unsure about, or makes them feel worried or upset, they can come to you for help.
