FACULTY OF THE WEEK: SCIENCE

Key stage 3

Year 7 have made a fabulous start to the year. They have been learning about safety in a lab, how to light a Bunsen burner and have just started a unit learning about cells and how they work together to make up all living things. All the year 7s have made microscope slides and learned how to use a microscope. We would love to see some of year 7s having a go at the model cell competition to win some points for their house!

Year 8 have been learning about acids and alkalis. They have used lots of new chemicals and have learned about neutralisation reactions. Some of the year 8s have shown amazing skills writing chemical equations. We are about to start a new unit about food and our digestive system.

Year 9 have been learning about both light and sound. They have learned about how the different waves travel and have made and used their own string telephones.

We have studied both the eye and the ear and this term there is a competition to make the best model eye or ear.




Key stage 4

Year 10 have made an amazing start to the GCSE course. They are studying forces and Motion, Mitosis and Bonding and the Periodic table. They have done great work modelling some difficult ideas in Science.

Year 11 have returned with a fantastic attitude, we are currently completing units on reactivity, electrolysis, photosynthesis and electricity.

Many of the year 11's have already started to attend revision classes and are well on their way to achieving some amazing grades. Keep up the good work!









This week 58 pupils from Year 8 and Year 9 took part in a STEM activity delivered by The Small Piece Trust and was sponsored by Amazon Future Engineers.

The STEM challenge was entitled 'Autonomous Vehicle Challenge' and upon completion the pupils will receive a Discovery CREST Certificate.



With driverless cars now becoming a reality after once being consigned to the pages of science fiction, the world needs a new wave of engineers and programmers to design, build and programme the next generation of autonomous vehicles.


Within this challenge the pupils used Lego Mindstorms and iPads to build and programme their own vehicles which they had to navigate around a course without any human interaction.

The day started with pupils completing an ice-breaker activity in their teams which required them to build the tallest paper tower just using 10 sheets of paper with points for the teams who achieved the tallest towers.




After this the day comprised of the pupils working in their teams to design a company logo, build an autonomous lego car containing a variety of different sensors which had been coded to move and avoid obstacles, a TV advert for their car if they were going to mass produce it and sell it to the public. Finally, the pupils had to present their work to each other at the end of the day.

The pupils worked hard and developed and utilised a wide variety of skills such as resilience, team work, project management, public speaking, decision-making, creativity and marketing to name a few!



Additionally, Paul from Amazon future engineers presented to the group about routes into a STEM career and higher education.




BOOK OF THE WEEK: Now is the Time for Running

Holidays taken during term time will not be authorised and may incur a Fixed Penalty Notice/ Fine. Pupils absent from school for 10% of the time are defined as 'Persistent absentees' and are less likely to make expected progress. Pupils need to be in school before 8.40am ready for Form Time. Pupils must be on time for all lessons.	 Uniform Pupils must be smart at all times. Footwear should be plain black shoes, business style with leather upper, no boots or large logos. Black knee-high socks (no bows) or black tights. Hoodies are not permitted. Outdoor coats should be removed inside the building. Blazers and school ties are to be worn at all times. Only badges awarded by the school may be worn upon the lapel of the blazer. Shirts must be tucked in. Tailored black trousers (no jeans, skinny leg, leggings or chinos etc). Pinafores & skirts must be knee length and not be rolled. School PE kit must be worn to every PE lesson. PE kit consists of: Black non-branded shorts/ leggings/tracksuits and school PE shirt. 	Travel Pupils should travel to and from school in full school uniform, adhering to school standards and expectations. When representing the school, pupils should adhere to school standards. Accessories & Haircuts All hairstyles should be smart in appearance. Accessories should be small in size and in the school colours. No extreme haircuts (full head/bare blade shaves, tram lines etc). Skin fades are acceptable if there is a minimum of a number 2 on top. Only natural colours/tones of hair are acceptable and if longer than shoulder length, must be tied up at all times.	 Jewellery & Makeup For health & safety reasons, pupils are not permitted to wear any jewellery other than a wrist watch. No earrings or piercings are allowed. Pupils who need a mobile phone for their journey to and from school should hand it in before entry to the school and collect it at the designated phone point when leaving. Banned items are any items which may cause damage to other pupils and or the school environment e.g. aerosols, cigarettes, marker pens, chewing gum, E-cigarettes, lighters weapons etc. DTRB has the right to ban any items during the aca- demic year that breaches health and safety.

At Dean Trust Rose Bridge, we believe that the standards of personal appearance are reflected in the attitudes of our pupils. By dressing to a high standard, it has been shown that our standards of work, and subsequent outcomes, improve over time. Please support the school by ensuring that your child adheres to the school's high standards of uniform and appearance. Each day staff will check that pupils are dressed in accordance with the above expectations.

Banned items should not be brought into school. Banned items will be confiscated by staff. Please refer to our Standards and Expectations poster for clarity on banned items.

Mobile phones: Any pupil found with their mobile phone during the school day will have this item confiscated. Confiscated phones will not be returned to a pupil under any circumstances. It is the parent/carers responsibility to collect the device from school at a mutually agreed time.

If pupils need to bring a mobile phone to school to ensure their safety when travelling, they must be handed in at the start of the day, before entering the building.

Sanctions will be applied to any pupil who fails to meet the school's standards and expectations.

Safer Internet Tips...

Top Tips for Parents and Carers

Have a look at the tips and links below with some suggestions on how to get you started and help you to stay safe and positive online. You and your family can #PlayYourPart in creating a better internet by...

Having conversations without judgement.

Whether by playing games, watching videos, or doing things your child enjoys, spending time together online is a great way to start conversations about the online world and how they're finding being a part of it.

It is important to ask questions and take an interest in what your child enjoys online. An essential part of having this open dialogue is to not judge, even if their behaviour or life online isn't what you wanted or expected. This ensures that your child feels they can come to you if ever they make a mistake or experience a problem online.

Knowing where you can learn more about their favourite apps and games.

Websites like Common Sense Media or The Family Gaming Database can be invaluable sources of information. When your child starts talking about a new game or app, why not do some research into the reporting and blocking options available? Then you can help your child if they come to you with an issue.

Getting support if things go wrong.

There are lots of organisations who are there to support you and your family if something has gone wrong. The Report Harmful Content website can help you with issues such as cyberbullying, impersonation and threats. You can report worrying behaviour towards children to CEOP. Find out more on Children's Get Help page.

Reassuring your child that whatever happens online, you are there to support them.

Let your child know that the best way to address any problem they have online, is to tell a trusted adult immediately. For example, this might include someone sending them a friend request; an online message; telling them to visit a specific website, or app; or asking them for their personal information. Reassure them that if anything happens online that they are unsure about, or makes them feel worried or upset, they can come to you for help.
